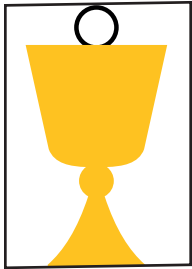

DECEMBER STEWARDSHIP MONTH TELL OUT MY SOUL

And Mary said, "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior"

Luke 1:46-47

As Christians we are story tellers. We have an ancient narrative, one that describes the beginning of time and the relationship between God and God's Creation. We see this story grow through the prophetic tradition until our story recounts the life and gifts of the Son of God. The story doesn't end with the Resurrection just as it did not end with the Cross, it continues in each of us today as we encounter and are transformed by the Good News.

Luke's Gospel is bookended by the animated story-telling of two women named Mary. Early in the Gospel, Mary the mother of Jesus, tells us of her encounter with the Divine who informs her that she will bear a child who will change the world. She proclaims her joy: "Tell out my soul! The Greatness of the Lord!" At the end of the Gospel, another Mary, Mary Magdalene, visits the tomb to discover it empty and receives instructions from the Risen Christ to go tell the others. She carries this Good News with jubilation to the Disciples.

What is your Good News; the idea, dream, challenge placed in your heart by God, that needs to be shared? What is the ministry to which you are called which will change the world, sharing your talents, gifts, and love with your neighbors?

In considering your pledge for 2026 think about your stories—the ones inside you, the ones you are still writing, the ones we tell about those who have gone before us. We are all a part of this ongoing narrative—the ongoing Creation. As you pray about how you will share your gifts with St. Barnabas this year, think about how God is calling you to tell out your soul, to spread the Good News far and wide.

REMEMBER TO BRING DONATIONS FOR THE DOBBS FERRY FOOD PANTRY

THE DIOCESAN CONVENTION AND A CHANGE IN OUR ASSESSMENT

Our thanks to Fr. Mathew and Dennis DiVincenzo for representing St. Barnabas at the Diocesan Convention which took place at The Cathedral of St. John the Divine on Saturday, November 16 from 8 AM to 5 PM.

Following a very lively debate, the Convention adopted the biggest changes to its finances in forty years. For fifteen months preceding the Convention, the Diocese worked towards a revised financial plan for its shared mission that would be fair, equitable, and sustainable across all 172 congregations. More than 80% of clergy and lay delegates from congregations voted to approve these reforms.

The new apportionment created two levels of assessment: 1% for congregations with expenses below \$250,000 and 5.75% for congregations with expenses over that amount. About half of the congregations in the Diocese fall into the first category and half fall into the second. The reforms will help stabilize finances both for congregations and for diocesan mission. With the new formula, 90% of congregations experience financial relief.

For St. Barnabas the new formula means a reduction in our former assessment of \$4874 to \$2500 or less, a most welcome relief in our tight budget.

Our coffee hour on Sunday November 16 was a celebration of the 50th wedding anniversary of Easow and Elizabeth Mathew. We were happy to be a part of such a wonderful occasion, and, of course, there was all that delicious Indian food!



TOWARDS A BETTER UNDERSTANDING

On Sunday, November 23 our parishioner, John Prendergast, spoke to us during coffee hour about the horrific situation in Sudan. John is a noted human rights activist and co-founder of The Sentry, an investigative and policy organization that seeks to disable multinational predatory networks that benefit from violent conflict, repression, and kleptocracy. Follow the money, the focus of The Sentry's work, has led to uncovering the corruption and greed that has fueled the wars, mass atrocities, and other human rights abuses in Sudan and other African countries. John also revealed a surprising connection that the NBA and Disney have in the Sudanese tragedy. We are grateful to John for his work, for sharing his knowledge and for helping us understand the causes of the tragedy in Sudan.
